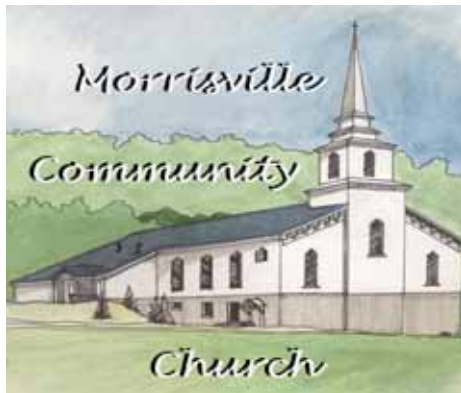

Easter Sunday: A Day of Celebration

Easter Sunday is a day of rejoicing and celebration for all Christians. It is the day we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ. As Cory Olney of our Sunday School said, "Easter is the day that Jesus rose from the grave. Jesus is with us---he is like the flower bulb, because like the flower from a bulb which returns each spring, so Jesus is new and fresh in our life each Easter." (Amen to that)

How we celebrate the day is enhanced by many customs that have been passed along over the generations. Here are some stories, thoughts and remembrances from our congregation.

New Clothes: Since the Roman Emperor Constantine made an official decree that new clothes should be worn on Easter, new clothes for Easter have been a part of the celebration. Irene Akers remembers the first Easter suit she made: "Way back in the 1950's, I took up sewing all my own clothes. One year, with Easter coming up, I decided to make a spring suit. I selected a dark green material. It took weeks of sewing, and with the sewing-on-of- the-buttons, I completed the outfit the day before Easter. I selected a pair of light green high heeled sandals and a matching green hat to go with this suit. I was very proud of my accomplishment, and my mother-in-law-to-be, who was an accomplished seamstress, gave me thumbs up. What could be better than that!!"

Although in our contemporary life, new clothes seem almost common place, there is still an excitement about a new special outfit for Easter. If you don't believe me just listen to Delaney Graves. Smiling and wiggling with excitement she told me this: "I have a new Easter dress! It has a purple top and blue-green bottom!"

Chicks---symbols of new life: Who remembers the chicks? Marlene Miner does: "Peep, Peep, Peep": The first Easter Sunday that my brother and I heard that sound as we came down stairs is very memorable. We quickly headed toward the sound coming from a cardboard box placed next to the wood burning part of our kitchen stove. Looking in the box we saw 6 little puffs of feathers---colored feathers---pink, blue, purple and yellow! Six colored baby chicks! We were excited to say the least! Each Easter after that, we listened for that sound and headed right to the kitchen stove. From the box our chicks eventually went to the chicken house in the backyard, and then...

Easter is a time to feast: What special Easter foods do you remember? Some of the answers surprised me: Sue Leamer---raised in Pennsylvania--- said, "Pickled eggs and beets. Oh, that is very Pennsylvania...remember the Pennsylvania Dutch." Lorraine Maggio (Needlers Group) and Nancy McPherson, spoke of a special Italian Easter bread. The bread is baked with raw colored eggs on top. (Google this bread---it is really pretty) Lorraine said her grandmother used to make an individual loaf for each grandchild. It was what she most look forward too. Well~~I was expecting at least one person to mention ham and vegetables (such as fresh asparagus smothered in a Hollandaise sauce).

Easter eggs and candy: What kind of a celebration would it be without the tradition of the Easter egg hunts, the Bunny and the candy? I was reminded of its importance by two of our Sunday School children: Reme Lee: "The Easter Bunny gives us candy"; Abbie Leamer: "We hide Easter eggs". Their smiles reminded me of the importance of this.

In Closing: Although I don't have a hand count concerning this from the congregation, I have often be told, "The one hymn I look forward to on Easter morning is the singing of "Christ the Lord Has Risen Today!". I agree. No variety needed when it comes to this hymn...lets sing it!!! Al-le-lu-ia!

Officers' Retreat

Saturday, March 7, your church officers met with the Rev. Earl Arnold for an officers' retreat at our church. Who are the officers? Your elected elders and deacons - see the list in this and future newsletters.

Elders and Deacons are expected to meet together at least annually but we recognize that more frequent get-togethers will help us serve our church better. Each group has duties assigned to it by our church's bylaws and by our Book of Order. However, one criticism we have encountered over the years is the need for better communication in our church. Retreats such as this past one and other combined meetings are intended to improve communication.

We started the day by reviewing past retreats and their goals. We looked at our church's strengths and weaknesses. What are the things we do well? What do we need to improve. Session has been working on these lists with Rev. Arnold. This allowed Deacons to share our thinking and to add their insights.

We recognized that in past retreats suggestions were made and goals established but without a plan to follow up, to measure progress, to identify weaknesses. To that end, we plan to meet as a group regularly - next time in June. Session also will be following the different ideas put forth.

After a lunch (thanks to Jeff Cring and Ellen Davis for arranging for and delivering sandwiches. Others supplied snacks and soda. Like an army, we travel better on our stomachs!

We identified several areas where our church could be strengthened and/or where we felt there were specific needs: students and the college, work with community, young people/families, spiritual awakening, worship - participation

and variety, unity, and finance. From that list we each chose an area of particular concern. Four groups looked at targeted areas: young people/families; worship; pastor; community.

The young people/young families group has identified several such families who have attended, whose children have been baptized, and/or whose children attended Sunday School. There is a goal to meet with these families and further involve them in the life of the church.

The worship group wants to see a bigger variety in worship as well as encourage participation by more people.

One group is going to investigate what we might look for in a part-time pastor.

The group looking at our relationship with the community wants to encourage more involvement from residents as well as make residents more aware of what we are doing here.

There are more specific plans but until they are more concrete, wait till next month for more details.

Everyone left the retreat feeling it had been profitable and looking forward to the next steps.
