But that rumbling, flashing snowplow reminded me of all the everyday happenings, especially in winter, for which I can be grateful: an array of interesting birds and wildlife (mostly, squirrels) at the birdfeeder; snow-laden evergreens; early morning coffee by the fireplace stove; and college basketball games. As I thought about all the many small things in life that make it good—and I try to keep unhappy thoughts at bay—my gratitude list has grown. I hope yours will grow too.

Prayer: Dear God, winters are often a challenge here in central New York. During the winter season our hearts are not always grateful for that “which falls from the heavens”. Help us to put our grumbling winter thoughts aside and remember to be grateful each day for the many small pleasures that make our everyday lives happy, interesting or both. Amen

In addition to the above:

- Items not sold or given away during the current season are boxed up and donated to St. Pauley's Mission in Rochester, NY which sends usable clothing, shoes and household items to third world countries. Cloth items not sent out of the country are sold by St. Pauley's to a rag company which generates money for St. Pauley's to continue their mission.
- Every December PW opens up the Clothes Basket on several evenings and makes appointments with families to bring their children in for the children to shop for family members. The children can pick out gifts, have them wrapped and tagged, and take them home for under the tree, at no cost. Parents also shop while waiting for their children and can take anything needed, at no cost.
- Low income individuals/families in need can obtain vouchers to shop at the Clothes Basket. These people are referred by the local school

nurse or Community Action Program.

- Baked goods are available at no cost every Saturday at the Clothes Basket, compliments of the local Price Chopper grocery store.

Under Old Business, we were pleased to have a good number from our church participate in our Christmas Caroling at Crouse Community Center. The men at Unity Acres in Orwell, NY appreciated all the Christmas cards received from our church. Please be sure to check out the picture and article posted on the bulletin board in the fellowship hall that they sent to thank us.
