*Tread Lightly**

“The earth is the LORD’s and the fullness thereof, the world and those who dwell therein”

Ps. 24: 1

“Ever since God created the world, his invisible qualities, both eternal power and his divine nature, have been clearly seen; they are perceived in the things that God has made.”

Romans 1:20

Years ago, in my Junior High Sunday School the teacher asked, “How have you experienced God?” A silence filled the room. After the question was posed to the class, I remember feeling very uncomfortable and looking down at my new Easter black patent shoes for inspiration. My shoes didn’t give me any inspiration, but perhaps my silent prayer helped: “Please, God, have someone say something.” My panic at being called on to give an answer gave way as a boy named Jimmy begin to speak: “How can a person not experience or believe in God when they watch a seed grow?”

Since that time and with the experience of age, I can immediately answer such a question. My guess is that most Christians can also tell of a time when they experienced God. My assumption is that many of these answers would be expressed in terms of our natural world, such as in a sunset or sunrise, or in the beauty of delicate a flower or stately tree. We know that our natural world is important in our experience of God. But we need to take heed, for our natural world is also fragile and in need of care.

The Presbyterian Hunger Program, due to its concern for the stresses on the environment, has created a Lenten calendar that prepares us for the Lent and Easter season and then leads us to focus on the environment. It includes scriptures such as Psalm 8, Genesis 1:29 and Luke 12:48 for reflection days. It provides action suggestions for days of carbon fasting. A carbon fast can include such things as “having a buy nothing day” to “taking a walk to appreciate the earth’s natural beauty” or “by thinking about the environment Jesus lived in and how it affected his ministry.” Thus, as the days of Lent unfold, and we reflect on “Christ’s ministry, death and resurrection”, we need to “slow down, take time, and examine our internal spiritual lives, and the way we live out our Christian faith in the world around us.” As the scripture says, “Ever since God created the world, his invisible qualities, both eternal power and his divine nature...are perceived in the things that God has made.”

Prayer: Dear God, we know you are with us always, but forgive us for not always being with you. Help us to be

better stewards of the natural environment and to “tread lightly on the face of (your) earth.” In Jesus name we pray. Amen

Remember: The love of God surrounds us. Rejoice in that love.

From the Food Pantry

Twenty-six families came to the pantry in January. Our first Saturday of the month was very busy. Six families came to the pantry, of which two were new. We had two weather related closings which could have affected our numbers for the month. \$643 in cash donations along with 346 food and hygiene items were received.

The Food Bank distributed the Equipment Grant money in January. We received \$2,779 towards a new freezer. Documentation of the purchase and use of this money needs to be provided to the Food Bank within sixty days of receiving the funds. Dave Andrews is currently securing new quotes for a

commercial freezer and refrigerator. The first half of the Emergency Food and Shelter Grant \$485 has been received. The Request for Second Payment Form has been submitted.

You may notice a new bulletin board in the hallway outside our pantry door. We will be publicizing the names of the business supporters that contribute to the MCC Food Pantry along with monthly donations. Also, our outdoor Morrisville CC Food Pantry sign was hit by an unknown, at this point. The sign itself appears to be o.k. but the supports will need to be reconstructed.
