The Peace That Is Meant to Be

Every Sunday after the Benediction, the song “Let There Be Peace on Earth” is played. On the first Sunday of Lent, as I stood listening, and following the words printed on the back of the bulletin, one phrase in the song stood out. In fact, I circled it: “The peace that was meant to be.”

We know that God’s peace encompasses more than just the absent of conflict or troubles. In the Old Testament the word “shalom” is the Hebrew word for peace. It is defined as one of the many blessing that “flow from a right relation with God”. It conveys spiritual, social and physical flourishing that comes from God. Basically, shalom is a term that includes all that makes life worthwhile. It is a peace within, without—and extended to all creation. The scholar, Cornelius Plantinga, explained it best: the Hebrew prophets defined shalom as “the webbing together of God, humans and all creation in justice, fulfillment and delight.”

The Hebrew prophets pointed to the future when a Messiah would come. As Christians, we know that God did send a Messiah, his son Jesus Christ, to reconcile humankind and all creation to God the Father. This reconciliation is the Peace of God, which is not just for us as individuals, but a peace to pass on to others and all the earth. The Apostle Paul described this reconciliation, and the price of it, in a letter he sent to the church in Colossae: “...all the broken and dislocated pieces of the universe—people and things, animals and atoms—get properly fixed together in vibrant harmonies, all because of his death, his blood that poured down from the Cross.”(Colossians 1: 19-20; MSG) This is the peace of shalom brought to us by Jesus. It is the peace that is meant to be.

Dear God, may our journey through Lent be a journey to the peace of shalom—a blessing from God for the all creation. In Jesus name we pray. Amen

Here we are in the season of Lent--a penitential time of self-reflection and added spiritual disciplines for many people who embrace the traditions of the larger church. But for us living here in Central New York where some of our harshest snowstorms have occurred in March, it can seem more like a time of desperation that screams, "Please God take me home now or at least transport me to the pristine beaches of Hawaii." Have you ever noticed no one, not even your pastor says, "Have a happy Lent!"

Yet, if we take such an escapist approach to a tradition that has served the people of the church well, we might miss out on an unprecedented time of spiritual growth. Sure, we can be like some who observe rigorous forms of self-denial for the sake of tradition, or we can embrace the opportunity to draw nearer to God through a sustained focus upon him through prayer, Bible reading, and Christian meditation.

I know from personal experience how this time of preparation for Resurrection Sunday can draw us toward a deeper understanding of the love of God for his children. Through small acts of self-denial, I was able to refocus on Jesus' setting aside his glory (see Philippians 2:5-11) for our benefit. I'm reminded of the Apostle Paul's experience when Ananias healed him of his blindness—it was like scales falling from my eyes giving me a clearer picture of just how much God loves us.

The bottom line is, Lent doesn't have to be or feel like one long season filled with pangs of hunger, long confessions, and self-flagellation; rather, it can be hallelujah I was blind but now I see! May the remainder of Lent bring new light and life to your

spiritual journey as you seek to draw nearer to God.

Ron & Charlene Bush, Sylvia McKinnon and Nate Miller participated in our meeting of February 8, 2021 by texting.

- The Red Cross had a very successful blood drive in the Fellowship Hall on 1/28/21 with a grand total of 24 units of blood collected.
- Dougherty Pharmacy held a COVID-19 vaccination on Friday, 2/5/21 in the Fellowship Hall with over 200 participants. The second dose will be held on 3/5/21.
- ABC FIRE, of Utica, held our yearly maintenance on 1/26/21. All extinguishers were inspected and a new one was placed in the sanctuary. One half of the extinguishers were required a six year inspection with the other half being done next year.
- The kitchen tank was evaluated.
- The sprinkler system will have its yearly maintenance check on Friday, 2/12/21.
- Culligan will be doing their yearly maintenance on 2/10/21.
- We experienced a leak in the Vestibule on Friday afternoon 2/5/21. It was found that we had accumulated more ice on the roof under the snow than we thought. Morse Construction was contacted. They were able to come and do removal the next morning (Saturday, 2/6/21). All (but the area over the sanctuary) was cleared. Ron spent a good part of Saturday clearing all that they removed (by tractor). We will be calling HFC (ins.) to see if any damage is covered.
- We are waiting for: boiler proposal, bulbs replaced outside. Do mowing letter next month.
- Our church service will be changing to 11:00AM on Sunday, 3/7/21. Our Pastor has internet service available every Sunday and a three minute quote on Wednesdays.

This is the account of God's Rainbow...

If verses 12 through 16 are God speaking why does He, in verse 16, refer to Himself in the third person? "...covenant between God and all living creatures..."

Maybe God refers to Himself as in the third person in verse 16 because He is stressing the fact that the covenant is between *God* and creation and a covenant with God is a promise. And a promise from God is a promise kept.

Or maybe the "quotes" are misplaced and verse 16 is us talking to ourselves and reminding ourselves that there is a covenant between God and His Creation... And maybe we should remind ourselves of this covenant whenever the "rains flood our lives" ...
