Leading the Flock

On Easter Sunday there was an article in the Utica Observer Dispatch entitled "Leading the Flock". This was followed by a subtitle "Lay pastors common as fewer seek ordination." The author of the article is Carolyn Bostick. The Utica Presbytery and its churches were featured.

The article read as follows:

With fewer choosing to formally join the clergy, unordained lay pastors - often part timers with other jobs on the side - are becoming a common sight in churches of many denominations. Ordained minister the Rev. Naomi Kelly of Old Forge said that the trend is a vital step for smaller congregations. "It really is a necessity because the smaller churches can't afford ordained pastors," Kelly said. "This is keeping them open." Kelly is co-dean of the Lay Academy for Utica Presbytery, a committee founded by the Presbyterian Church in the late 1990's to offer classes for perspective lay pastors in the area.

Out of 32 churches in the Utica Presbytery about 13 have lay pastors. One of those is a summer church and three share two pastors between them. For many lay pastors, the ministry is something they may have been interested in for years, but only pursued as a second career.

During the week, Jay Williams III is a lawyer in Clinton but on the weekends, he serves as lay pastor for the up and coming congregation of a few dozen people at First Presbyterian Church of Augusta and Vernon Center. His training to become a lay pastor included several years of theology lessons and instruction on church protocol. The opportunity to preach and tend to a congregation has a lot of appeal for him, especially in smaller churches where he can get to know individual members better. And those congregations often want to keep their autonomy without losing a pastor. "Smaller churches still want a meaningful service," Williams III said.

Lay pastor George Whitton is a retired history teacher who serves the First Presbyterian Church of Booneville and sees the recent trend toward lay pastors as history coming full circle. It's like a return to the early church. In my mind, the future of the church is really geared to lay pastors. There's a reality that full-time pastors cost more money, " Whitton said.

The article continued with a brief description of how other denominations are handling clergy shortage.

Later in the article:

While a lay pastor can be a sign of hardship, Kelly said some local churches, including Williams III's congregation in Augusta, have thrived under their leadership.

"The people love their own community and don't want to see the churches closed," she said. "They're a force to be reckoned with in the community."
