From the Food Pantry

Matt and Lela Volz of Greyrock Farm in Cazenovia is a new and additional resource for fresh produce. They are a young couple who are into organic farming and raise their own beef cows and pigs. Mark and I visited the farm in March and came back with 18 pounds of organic carrots. When harvest season comes this fall, hopefully they will have an abundance of fresh produce for us to select from at wholesale prices.

We had one emergency call on March 21. An individual had no transportation and was desperate for some food. Mark did not hesitate and together with our volunteers that day put together a variety of foods and he made the delivery after the pantry closed. Twenty-three families shopped at the pantry in March and two new families were enrolled. \$176.00 in cash donations were received along with 417 food items.

A building security, safety audit was completed at Cornell Cooperative Extension. New procedures have been put in place for security and safety. The lower outer door will be kept locked and shoppers coming to the pantry will have to knock for entry. A notice has been posted on the door. Anyone wanting entry to the Cornell offices upstairs will have to go back up and around to the main entrance and buzz for someone to open the door for entry to the hallway.

Thank you to all of those who have donated and continued to help stock our pantry shelves. Some of the items we are in need of are: toothpaste, toothbrushes, deodorant, bar soap or body wash, and shampoo.

“Philemon”

Psalm 104:34

May my meditation be pleasing to him, as I rejoice in
the LORD.

2 Timothy 3:16-17

*All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching,
rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that
the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every
good work.*

If the above verse is to be believed, and I think it is, then it stands to reason that all the Books of the Bible should be studied. So I picked a very short one of which I had never heard. I asked myself, if God had a hand in the creation of the Bible as we know it then what could be in a short Book like that of Philemon that makes it important enough to be included? It is after all the third shortest book. So how important can it be?

Let's see...

1 chapter, 25 verses, 335 words...

It is a letter from Paul to his friend Philemon and members of his church. The letter asks Philemon to forgive and welcome back Philemon's thieving runaway slave named Onesimus. After stealing from his master, and running away, Onesimus fell in with Paul and was even imprisoned with him.

Paul tells Philemon that Onesimus is such a good person and Christian now that he would like to keep him around, even going so far as to call him son. Paul doing what is right is sending Onesimus back to Philemon not as a slave but as a brother and if Philemon wants to be repaid what was stolen Paul will pay it for Onesimus.

This is the gist of the letter.

So even though this is a short book it can, as Second Timothy says, be useful for *“teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness”*.

Onesimus, a thieving runaway slave has been, through his association with Paul, redeemed and saved and is thus loved by Paul as a brother. Paul is even willing to pay Onesimus' debt. If Onesimus can be redeemed then surely anyone can be saved. If Onesimus, a thief and runaway slave is worth enough as a person to have his debts paid for him then certainly anyone has worth.

I think this is why the letter to Philemon is in the Bible to remind us that through our Lord, Jesus Christ, there is hope, redemption and salvation for anyone and everyone no matter what their circumstances. AMEN.
