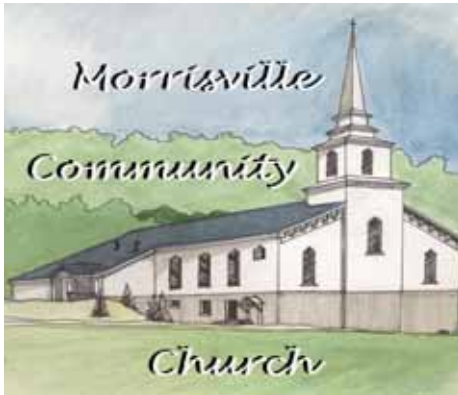

## ***From the Worship Committee***

### **A Festival of Harvest: Pentecost to Advent**

*“There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven: ...a time to plant and a time to reap...” Ecclesiastes 3:1,2b*

Autumn has arrived. We are now entering what I like to call “October Country.” It is a time of pumpkins, apples, concord grapes and colored leaves. It is harvest time, although the harvesting of summer’s bounty began weeks ago: Katie Bracy has canned 199 jars of vegetables from her garden; Silvia McKinnon has, and is, still picking fresh lettuce; sweet corn abounds, and I am told will last until the end of October; and since mid-August my neighbor has been leaving gifts of fresh dug potatoes on my doorstep. Happiness is truly all this fresh produce. Life is good.

But what has grown in our spiritual gardens? How bountiful is this harvest? Only recently did I become aware of comparing Ordinary Time, which is the period in the Christian calendar between Pentecost and Advent, as a time for Christians to tend to the “spiritual harvest.” How did I learn this? The answer: from a friend preparing her Sunday sermon. She said, “I am organizing my sermon around Pentecost.” I said, “Pentecost? That was weeks and weeks ago.” (*And as of Sunday, Oct. 4, 2015, Pentecost was 19 Sundays ago*) She said, “True. But what has happen since this celebration? Have we been tending our spiritual gardens?” She continued to explain: “We are all excited on Pentecost Sunday. It is a renewal celebration of the Holy Spirit entering the world and our lives. We leave the church service that day with good intentions. We are feeling good. Then, in the Ordinary Time of the Christian calendar, which begins the day after Pentecost Sunday and ends on Advent Sunday, we are to work on the spiritual harvest. It is a time where we should ask God to help us see the people around us who are ready for spiritual harvest. But then as the days past and the Sundays past, our enthusiasm can disappear. The business/busy-ness of our day to day lives takes precedent. Within all this activity, our spiritual garden becomes messy---full of weeds like---well, like my own unattended flower garden.” (This give us pause to laugh, because we just walked by her own weed patch of a flower garden.) She concluded with, “We forget that during this time we should ask God to help us see the people around us who are ready for spiritual harvest. And like any garden, what we sow so will we reap.”

The scripture John 4: 34-36 says this best:

“My food,” said Jesus “is to do the will of him who sent me and to finish his work. Do you not say, ‘Four months more and then the harvest’? I tell you, open your eyes and look at the fields! They are ripe for harvest. Even now the reaper draws his wages, even now he harvests the crop for eternal life, so that the sower and the reaper may be glad together.”

Prayer: We thank you God for the abundant harvest we now enjoy. But please restore in us the energy and enthusiasm to nurture and cultivate our spiritual gardens. Open our eyes to this awaiting harvest. Give us energy to carry our faith forward to meet the future with open eyes and hearts. Amen
