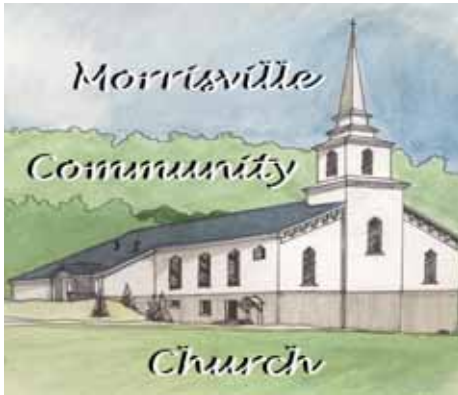

ADULT BIBLE STUDY

From the Worship Committee

“Sipping Coffee at 5:30 A.M.”

“I will awaken the dawn. I will praise you, O Lord.”
Ps.57:8-9

It is very early in the morning. I open the door even though the pre-dawn air is quite cool. As I sit sipping my first cup of coffee, I gaze out across the yard. The sky is clear, but the trees, grass and flowers are dark silhouettes. The only movement is three Blue Jays quietly—amazing for Blue Jays to be quiet—looking for some sunflower seeds on our feeding stump. The words of Psalm 46: 10, “Be still and know that I am God...” drift through my thoughts. But the world is not static, and the dark silhouettes of trees, grass and flowers turn gradually to their natural colors. The green of the lawn shimmers with dew. Soon the dark shadows on the Norway spruce turn golden. As it always does this time of year, the morning sun of late summer is doing its thing: turning this quiet hour into a golden hour. Psalm 139: 14 describes it perfectly: “Your works are wonderful, I know that full well.” But the quiet time and golden world slip quickly by. I am now hearing traffic; the quiet Blue Jays decide to squawk; and the world is now in full light. Perhaps a second cup of coffee is in order. However, that second cup never matches the pleasure and peace of that very first cup in early morning when the world awakens and I awaken with it.

*Prayer: “When morning gilds the skies, my heart awakening cries: May Jesus Christ be praised! Alike at work and prayer to Jesus I repair: May Jesus Christ be praised! Let earth’s wide circle round in joyful notes resound: May Jesus Christ be praised! Let air and sea and sky from depth to height reply: May Jesus Christ be praised!” Amen

*(Prayer: verses 1 &3, “When Morning Gilds the Skies”, Presbyterian Hymnal, p.487)
